This year's Dance Clan choreographers are Glory Tuohy-Daniell, Ryan Pearson and Sani Townson. Glory, Ryan and Sani are all gifted artists endowed with a vision and passion for Indigenous storytelling. They represent an exciting and vibrant future for Bangarra as they embark on their first professional choreographic commission for the company.

Presented at home in our Studio Theatre. Dance Clan 2023 has expanded the program to include pathways and mentorship for First Nations theatre designers and composers. We are thrilled to have emerging Indigenous Creatives, Shana O'Brien (Set Designer), Clair Parker (Costumer Designer), Maddison Craven (Indigenous Lighting Trainee) and composers Amy Flannery and Leon Rodgers (current David Page Music Fellows), and Brendon Boney (Inaugural David Page Music Fellow). We also acknowledge and thank our incredible team of Creative mentors, Jacob Nash, Karen Norris, Steve Francis and Jennifer Irwin for their knowledge and generous guidance nurturing our next generation of Indigenous Creatives.

Dance Clan is not only about nurturing young Indigenous artists, but also how we till the ground for a new generation of artistic expressions. We thrive when we can encourage new ideas to germinate and grow, and empower artists to be bold, curious yet authentic and grounded by Country, Culture and Kin. It is our role as a Cultural foundation to unearth and care for the new creative voices that will carry our stories forward, inspired by a new energy that elevates our Indigenous artistic expressions to a reimagined future.

Kulka

Choreographed by Sani Townson, *Kulka* is a three-part piece that pays homage to Sani's grandfather.

Kulka runs through our veins. Heritage and lineage bloodlines are the very essence of who we are as Lagaw Mabaygal (Island People). Family cultural ties and bonds are what has been taught throughout our Samu, Koedal and Dhoeybaw clans. Songs and dances are taught and handed down from generations before us. This encourages us to keep our culture strong and have pride in what is rightfully ours to present to those who understand us as clanship and our identity as Lagaw Mabaygal.

Keeping Grounded

In her choreographic debut, Glory Tuohy-Daniell explores the concept of grounding.

Grounding is placing your bare feet on the ground and connecting into the energy of the earth. The earth has a negative charge and humans a positive charge. Our ancestors would walk around barefoot or use natural fibres for their shoes and until the 1960s, people were wearing leather soled shoes—allowing energy to run from the earth to our body. Since the introduction of rubber soled shoes, humans have been disconnected from the earth—the energy cannot travel through rubber, and this impacts our physical health.

I'm very interested in mental health, physical health and how grounding can heal you. With this piece I want to plant a seed and start a conversation about our health in all forms.

FRANCES RINGS **Artistic Director**

Frances Rings is a descendant of the Wirangu Tribe from the West Coast of South Australia, Frances was appointed Artistic Director of Bangarra Dance Theatre in 2023.

Frances made her main stage choreographic debut with Rations (Walkabout, 2002), receiving outstanding critical acclaim. Frances created a further seven works for Bangarra: Bush (2003, co-choreographed with Stephen Page), Unaipon (2004), X300 (2007), Artefact (2010), Terrain (2012), Sheoak (2015) and SandSong (2021, co-choreographed with Stephen Page).

Terrain is listed on the NSW Higher School Certificate Dance, as compulsory study for Appreciation (Dance).

In 2023, Frances will choreograph Yuldea, her first work as Artistic Director of Bangarra.

Frances has worked as a choreographer and dancer with Australia's leading dance companies including West Australian Ballet, Tasdance, Meryl Tankard, Leigh Warren, and Legs on the Wall. The Australian Ballet and internationally with companies including KAHA:WI Dance Theatre (Turtle Island) and Atamira Dance Company (Aotearoa).

Frances was appointed Head of Creative Studies at NAISDA Dance College from 2016-2019 and has directed five NAISDA end-of-vear productions.

Frances has received multiple awards for her work including six Helpmann Awards (2003, 2010, 2013, 2016, 2017), a Deadly Award (2003), Australian Dance Award (2004) and a Green Room Award (2011)



SANI TOWNSON Choreographer (Kulka)

Sani comes from a strong cultural family who are of Samu, Koedal. Dhoevbaw clans of Saibai Island. He studied at NAISDA 1996-2000 and danced with Bangarra 2001-2006. Since leaving Bangarra, he has worked with SBS, NITV and ABC, and collaborated with companies such as Gondwana Voices, Sydney Children's Choir, QANTAS, Leigh Warren & Dancers, Insite Arts and NAISDA Dance College. He has also choreographed for Christine Anu. Felix Riebel, Kate Miller-Heidke, Sean Choolburra and Electric Fields. In 2020. Sani returned to Bangarra as the Youth Programs Coordinator while developing his own interactive children's show Lagaw Mabaygal (Ailan ppl).



RYAN PEARSON Choreographer (5 Minute Call)

Ryan is of Biripi and Worimi descent on his mother's side and Minang, Goreng and Balardung on his father's side. He joined Bangarra in 2017 as part of the Russell Page Graduate Program, Ryan was nominated in the 2020 Australian Dance Awards for Most Outstanding Performance by a Male Dancer for his performance in Jiří Kylián's Stamping Ground (30 years of sixty five thousand, 2019).



GLORY TUOHY-DANIELL Choreographer (Keeping Grounded)

Glory is a descendant of Indialandii Dhidhanu and Alvewarre Aboriginal tribes, in the North West Queensland and Northern Territory. She joined Bangarra in 2016 as part of the Russell Page Graduate Program.

The experience that has made the biggest impact on Glory was attending a cultural residency on Saibai and Moa Islands in the Torres Strait and Elcho Island, North-East Arnhem Land

A highlight of her career was performing in Ochres. To be the same age as the show itself and to have been able to perform in such a historic work, is something she will remember forever.



KAREN NORRIS Lighting Designer

Karen Norris' origins are Indigenous from Aotearoa of Morori descent. She has designed productions throughout Australia and Europe working as a designer with Bangarra on The Dreaming (1999), SKIN (2000), Terrain (2012) and LORE (2015). Karen is a multi-awardwinning designer, some of her awards include Helpmann's for SKIN, Terrain, LORE, Narelle Benjamin's works In Glass (2011) and Hiding in Plain Sight (2015), and most recently Barbara and the Camp Dogs which also won a Green Room (2020).



BRENDON BONEY Composer (Keeping Grounded & 5 Minute Call)

Brendon Boney is a Wiradiuri/ Gamilaroi man from Wagga Wagga and was the inaugural David Page Music Fellow, He has toured internationally as a recording and performing artist during the past decade and is an APRA Professional Development Award winner. He toured with Ilbiierri Theatre's acclaimed production Black Ties as Music Director and made his acting debut in the same production. Brendon has composed for Belvoir Theatre. Ensemble Theatre and Sydney Theatre Company.



Set Designer

Shana O'Brien is a First Nations artist and dancer who was brought up on Darkinjung land. She is a NAISDA and Sydney College of the Arts graduate. She is currently a dancer with Wagana Dancers and Jannawi Dance Clan. In her own practice she likes to find the in between spaces, and meeting points of dance and visual arts. In 2022 she began her first role in set design for Bangarra's Dance Clan.

AMY FLANNERY Composer (Kulka)

Amy Flannery is currently a David Page Music Fellow. Her journey as a young First Nations artist has taken in a great deal in a very short time. A Wiradjuri woman based on Wangal Country in Sydney, Amy studied dance and music simultaneously during high school and at NAISDA Dance College, After graduating from NAISDA in 2018, she choreographed and composed for several independent productions, building skills and delving into a range of technologies to craft a personal creative voice.



CLAIR PARKER Costume Designer

Clair is a Takaringa Tiwi woman born and raised in Darwin, NT. She is a visual artist, graphic designer, and fashion designer based in Perth, WA. In 2016 she became the first Aboriginal graduate from the Whitehouse Institute of Design. Since then, she's presented a fashion collection at Australian Fashion Week and has worked with brands such as R U OK, Redken, and First Nations Fashion + Design. A significant milestone was creating a gown in 2017 worn at the 89th Academy Awards. Clair provides bespoke, ready-to-wear garments for her women's wear fashion label Clair Helen.

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

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


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
